There are a number of stories in the New Testament, specifically the gospels that I love so much and that I hearken back to over and over again. One of them is the parable of the prodigal son; another is the parable of the Good Samaritan. Stories that aren't officially parables but in my opinion have deeper meanings that I also continue to use as perfect examples of faith are the feeding of the five thousand and perhaps the best, Jesus trying to get Peter to go out with him to walk on water.

I love this story because it is a really good example of what I believe faith really looks like. Faith isn't getting on a plane in hopes that you will make it to your destination. Planes have been found to more often than not get from point a to point b. Faith is not believing that your car will start when you turn the key, more often than not this tends to happen. Most of our lives are run in this fashion, when you jump up, gravity will bring you back to earth. The truth is, we place very little faith in anything in our lives, we take very few chances and risks. We tend to play it safe with everything we do. You could justify this behavior by saying we play it smart and I get that. I will only go so far with that theory though. Obviously, having faith doesn't mean being foolish or careless. Don't go jumping off the roof of a building without a parachute or net and claim that faith will catch you. And seriously, hear me when I say this...don't go trying to walk on water if you can't swim. While the story of Jesus walking on the water and Peter struggling to do so are read as literal and I have no problem with that being the case.

I also believe this story like many others in the gospels hold deeper meanings than what lies on the surface. What the story of Jesus walking on the water is telling us is that it's one thing to have faith in the boat. To believe when you get in it that it will carry you to the other side. It's another thing entirely to go out into the water and leave that boat. The boat we call faith but in truth it is actually not what we believe in but what we already know. Everything else outside of the boat is that which we don't know. And since we don't know it...we have a choice, to reject it or have faith in it. We find that when it comes to our faith, we are clinging to the boat but we are not clinging to Jesus. How do we know? Because he is already out there with an outstretched arm telling us where he is, is where we need to be.

Whatever boundaries you have placed in your life, status quo, the norm, safe comfortable places, Jesus is calling you to have faith and to break down those boundaries. Our spirits were made to expand and explore, to get out of our boats and see Christ in the vast expansive places in our lives and to know that all of us were made for more in this world than the safe faithless human creations we have grown so accustomed to.

"We will work with each other, we will work side by side. And we'll guard each man's dignity and save each man's pride."

Do you ever look around the world and wonder where all the love and unity has gone? Just a quick trip through social media will reveal all of the keyboard warriors that, based on what they write, would appear to have no heart. I think the saddest thing to me is when I see someone that I know proclaims themselves to be a Christian, yet uses that platform to shame, belittle, judge, or condemn others. The last year or two have truly been a public display of that for all to see.

"A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you are also to love one another. By this all people will know that you are my disciples if you have love for one another." — John 13:34–35

Jesus, in his own words, gave us a new commandment. The greatest commandment. A single request: to love. Love like he loved. Let's reflect on what Jesus did to show love. He sought out the tax collector.

It isn't the volume of notes written in our Bibles, our playlist of worship songs, or our attendance at church events. We are to be set apart by the love we have for one another. Not just Christians. We are to show love to everyone, everywhere, every day, all the time. Yes, even those we disagree with. Even those whose actions disgust us. Even those who are living in sin. Even those who vote for someone different than us. Even those who make different decisions than us. The verse has no parameters on who we are to love and not love. We are to show the world what it means to have the love of our Savior living inside of us.

Will they know you are a Christian by your words? Your actions? Your good deeds? Your Facebook posts? Your social media comments? Your donations? Or will they know you are a Christian by your love?
