

On my way down to Annual Conference this past month, I decided to meditate on the Lord's Prayer. To really take a special moment to once again remind myself of this important prayer. And what came to my surprise was just how simplistic and bare bones the whole thing really is. At the start of the prayer comes some descriptive language on who God is. We debate over and around the masculinity of God as if that's really a thing when all I believe Jesus was trying to do when calling God the father was to illustrate intimacy and God's person, the creator of the universe's relatability. So, Jesus calls God "Father" and proclaims where he resides, that being heaven. He then says holy is your name. Then comes the commission in a sense. Jesus says God's kingdom has come and if we are to realize this and actualize this holy fact, we are to do God's will. We are to do God's will here on earth as it is in heaven. In heaven, it is reality. On earth, there are a few roadblocks. Heaven is a possibility here on earth but heaven doesn't come as easily. For it to come we must constantly be at work in doing not our own will but the will of God. So what does that look like you might ask. Glad you did.

The next part of the prayer tells us what is required. This is not a huge list but it is indeed most challenging. The next two requests are the most essential yet most difficult parts of Christian living. The first is that we are to ask for daily bread. Not more than we need but just what we need. The second is that we acknowledge first and foremost that we need forgiving. That in and of itself is difficult for the prideful. "Who me?" we might say. But then as if that wasn't enough we are told we are to forgive those who have sinned against us. These two requirements. Give us only what we need because we trust that you will always provide just enough, which means to live in trust and not in worry or fear and then live in a state of humility and mercy through forgiveness. That's it. After that we pray that temptation and evil don't cause us to lose sight of these two requirements. Finally we tell God once again how awesome God is. It's funny how we call ourselves Christians meaning that we are followers of Jesus and yet, how we struggle to follow just those two simple yet difficult requirements. We justify the dickens out of both of these requirements, and we avoid them by making other minor requirements, if you will, more important.

I didn't realize how ingrained one of our justifications for one of these requirements is until I sang the song "Breathe" one Sunday morning and noticed the lyrics. "You are my daily bread". And then I recalled a devotional book series titled "Daily Bread." We have turned the phrase "give us this day our daily bread" into a prayer that we have a devotional time with God each day. Make no mistake about it, we need God every day and we need to be in devotion with God. But God is not the daily bread that the Lord's Prayer is talking about. We aren't praying "Give us our daily dosage of You, O God". Our prayer is for us to not store up but to share in our wealth. Period.

If we, but look in the mirror and come to grips with our inability to follow through in our actions that we pray in the Lord's Prayer, it should cause us to really hear the final words we pray at the end. If the kingdom is God's and the power is God's and the glory is God's why do we continue to trust only in ourselves? There is no justification. There is only our hope in a merciful God. Sorry to be such a downer but it's my calling and vocation. Enjoy the rest of summer and peace be with you!




Year-Round Advice for Seasonal Dry Eyes - Preservative-free lubricating drops, a humidifier, sunglasses and preventive medications can help with dry eyes, no matter the season.

Eye drops being dropped into an adult's eye - Many people associate dry eyes with cold, stale winter months. But evaporative dry eyes can strike year-round, even when you live in an area that doesn't experience all four seasons. Optometrist Alexandra Williamson, OD, shares some dry eye triggers and what you can do to prevent them.

How does a change in seasons affect dry eyes? Because of changes in weather and reintroduction to allergens (like pollen or dust), seasonal shifts may cause an increase in styes and clogged meibomian glands. These glands produce an oil that keeps your tears smooth. If they get clogged or blocked, your tears don't get enough oil and become thin and runny. This leads to evaporative dry eyes, a condition in which your tears dry up quickly, leaving your eyes irritated, dry and uncomfortable.

Dr. Williamson says some of the environmental factors that can trigger dry eye symptoms (like itchiness, redness and watery eyes) include:

- Seasonal allergies, like pollen in the spring
- Low humidity in the winter
- Dry, hot air in the summer
- Increased wind and autumn allergens, like ragweed

"Your eyes may be drier because of your hormones, your diet, the environment and the air around you or even because you're not blinking as much," adds Dr. Williamson. "We see these problems year-round."

Soothing dry eyes all year - One of the keys to treating dry eyes is having regular, annual appointments with an optometrist, especially if you know your dryness gets worse in a specific season.

"For anyone dealing with seasonal allergies, we can recommend certain allergy medications ahead of time because we know their symptoms are coming," notes Dr. Williamson. "We know medication will make them feel better and prevent them from having histamine release that would cause more symptoms later on."

When dry eyes strike, try not to rub your eyes. This causes further irritation and introduces more of the allergen and other bacteria directly to your affected eyes. Instead:

- Use preservative-free, lubricating eye drops as prescribed.
- Follow your doctor's recommendations for wearing contacts, as they can make dry eyes worse.
- Wash your hands before touching your face.
- Wash your face before bed to remove allergens and keep your eyelids clean from leftover makeup, creams and lotions.
- Wear sunglasses when you're outside to shield your eyes from the wind.
- Use a humidifier to help put moisture back into the air during summer or winter.
- Limit screen time and take frequent breaks during the day to give your eyes a rest.

If you try these strategies and still have a hard time with dry eyes, an optometrist can help you see more clearly with other kinds of treatment.

"With a lot of advancements in the way we treat dry eyes, we can help with different eye drops or medications. For more serious, chronic cases, we can offer implants or eyelid repositioning," reassures Dr. Williamson.

"All of these procedures are individualized, so it's best to come in and talk to the experts to see what solutions work for you."
